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+ HISTORY OF THE STITHTON BAPTIST CHURCH +
+ RADCLIFF, KENTUCKY +

+ Revised this date of May 17, 1989 +
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On January 9, 1887, The Stithton Baptist Church, located at Stithton, Kentucky, was organized. After prayer and a sermon by Dr. Basil Manly of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky, the body adopted a church covenant, articles of faith and rules of decorum.

The Stithton Baptist Church was located in the beautiful farm town of Stithton, Kentucky. Rev. R. W. Jones was called as the first pastor and preached his first sermon as pastor on February 19, 1887.

Thomas Stith founded the agricultural community in the early 1850's.

Benjamin Jones, the town's (his relationship to R.W. Jones, if any, is unknown) first post-master, was operating a hotel in 1881. The only other businesses at that time were J.F. Wooldridge's General Store and Ed Carrico's wagonmaking shop.

After a four month pastorate by Rev •. Jones, Rev. t?C.Hooldridge was named pastor. Again, any relationship between this pastor and the owner of the General Store is unknown. Stithton, Kentucky, in 1910 had a population of 400 people. One description of the town around 1910 states that there were two general stores, two dry goods stores, one hardware store, two banks (Union Bank of Stithton and Peoples Bank of Stithton), three churches (Baptist, Catholic and Methodist), three doctors, a dentist and a two-room school. In 1909 the largest gooseberry farm in the world was located near Stithton and was opened by H.O. Rahm.

Meanwhile, Benjamin Jones was selling off his farm to the railroad for a depot and freight sidings and to various newcomers for homes. The Louisville and Nashville Railroad came through the area in 1873. That railroad station in the town of Stithton would later become the most photographed and remembered landmark of the town.

The famous Dixie Highway was constructed through Stithton in 1837 and was first known as the Louisville and Nashville Turnpike and was operated as a toll road. The old turnpike is now known as Wilson Road.

Then the Federal Government bought the town of Stithton for the establishment of Camp Knox. Camp Knox was established in August of 1918 at Stithton, Kentucky, and was named in honor of Henry Knox, artillery general and Secretary of War 1785-1794.

In January of 1917 the Government bought the Stithton Baptist Church property as a part of Camp Knox and for several years the building was used as an Army Chapel. In a short time, the entire town of Stithton was bought by the Government and the church disbanded in May of 1919. Families relocated.

On June 22, 1979, the Department of the Army, to commemorate the town of Stithton and note its location, named the traffic circle on Post STITHTON CIRCLE. Yes, the Fort Knox traffic circle was where the small town of Stithton once existed.

The town of Stithton was no more and residents dispersed to all parts of Hardin, Meade and Bullitt counties. Some moved to the newly formed town of New Stithton just south of Camp Knox.

Then Camp Knox became Fort Knox and expanded again and New Stithton was bought and on September 27, 1942, the church trustees were authorized to convey the title of the church property to the United States Government. In these two acquisitions Fort Knox displaced 1,460 families.

The church disbanded from 1919 to 1926.

In the fall of 1919 Horace McCullum bought a tract of land along the Dixie Highway and built a general store (across from Kroger's, which is now Sav-U-Foods) and named the community Radcliffe in honor of his good friend, Major Radcliffe, who was then commander of the Quartermaster Corps at Camp Knox.

In 1923 a small remnant of members met together with the Methodists, who had also sold their property to the Government, and together they repaired an abandoned school house. This building was used for Sunday School and for separate preaching services with the Methodists having their own pastor and the Baptists using students from the Baptist Seminary in Louisville once each month.

From 1943 to 1948 the church, with the help of "Mother" Sallie Brown, stayed together even though without a church building. Some worship was conducted in the U.S.O. Club in Radcliffe by these Stithtonians. On March 23, 1948, they voted to build a church building on Dixie Highway (Highway 31 W) in Radcliffe, Kentucky. In 1943, at the height of the Second World War, Radcliffe really began to grow. Radcliff was incorporated in 1956 with 2,200 people. At this time of incorporation the "e" was dropped from the name Radcliff.

- On October 22, 1982, L.F. Hibberd and Earl Brown showed Pastor Waggoner where the previous churches had been located.
- 1888 - a one room frame building located on now what is 5th Avenue and C Street - across from the Post General's driveway, Fort Knox.
Rev. B. F. Hagan, pastor at the time of building.
- 1907 - the old church was torn down and a new one constructed in the same location. Rev. W. F. Jagers, pastor at the time of building.
It was another one room frame building. On June 26, 1915, electric lights were put in at a cost of \$30.30.
- 1934 - A one room brick veneer building with full basement was built in New Stithton on Wilson Road across from number nine tee at Anderson Golf Course. The first service was held in it in October, 1934. The Stithton Baptist Church was then with the Salem Association, joining with the Severns Valley Association in 1936.
Rev. C. L. Niceley was the pastor at the time of building.
- 1948 - W. M. Brown and D. E. New gave the site for this building, located on Dixie Highway (31 W) in Radcliff. It was a brick veneer building with full basement. This building was torn down on (insert date)
Rev. Denny Stringfellow was the pastor in 1948.
In 1961, Pastor Waggoner led the church to remodel the sanctuary to create nine class rooms. The basement is now used for our ceramics class. The old pews, pulpit furniture and baptistry were sold to a sister church.
- 1955 - An educational building was built behind the 1948 church building,
Rev. W. R. Cook was the pastor at the time of building.
- 1961 - On August 3, 1960, a motion passed to borrow \$130,000 to build a new 550 seat sanctuary behind the educational building. It was erected at a cost of \$162,035 and was used for the first time on June 18, 1961.
Rev. W. R. Cook was the pastor at that time, resigning on July 5, 1961.
- 1974 - On July 26, 1961, Gene B. Waggoner was called as pastor. His first Sunday was August 7, 1961.
On April 29, 1973, ground was broken for a new recreational-educational building. Church Bonds in the amount of \$416,000 were sold in 1973 for the erection of this building. It contains a regulation size basketball floor, a kitchen, a fellowship hall, a game room, two locker rooms and 35 new class rooms. It was dedicated on September 8, 1974.
Rev. Gene Waggoner, pastor at that time.
- 1986 - Because of overcrowding in the 1961 sanctuary, two Sunday morning worship services were conducted by Brother Waggoner beginning on April 3, 1977, in order to seat the crowds. After nine years of two Sunday morning worship services, the church voted to build a new sanctuary on May 5, 1985. Ground was broken for it on Sunday, September 15, 1985.
- A contract for the new sanctuary and the renovation of the present sanctuary was signed with the Jenkins-Essex Construction Company at a cost of one million five hundred eight thousand three hundred sixty-five dollars (\$1,508,365.00) on October 21, 1985.
- A three-year "Together We Build" program was entered into from November 28, 1982, through November 24, 1985. Upon its completion the program was called "Together We Built" and carried on.

Through Security Church Finance, Inc., of Houston, Texas, the church sold a bond issue of \$1,300,000 in 1985. The maturity schedule is from December 1, 1986, through December 1, 2000.

The new sanctuary was used for the first time on the Sunday before Thanksgiving, November 23, 1986.

Adding furnishings, sound system, carpet, pews, stained glass windows, etc., to the construction costs, the total cost was in the neighborhood of one million eight hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,850,000).

This new sanctuary, seating 1,300, is fan-shaped with five sections of pews-- a total of 130 pews. They are sapela (cherry) wood, rose fabric, with white ends. The baptistry cross is also made of sapela wood and backlighted.

The floor is sloped and six laminated wood beams can be seen spanning over one hundred and thirty feet above the worship area.

There is a balcony on three sides, and stained glass windows on either side of the baptistry. There are six chandeliers and six ceiling fans. The entrance hall also contains 5 special stained-glass windows.

The main floor has the approximate dimensions of two basketball floors side to side, with proper sight lines and accoustically-angled walls. The carpet color is burgundy and there is enough of it to carpet fifteen houses. With the completion of the new sanctuary, work began on the renovation of the existing sanctuary. It was converted into offices, reception area and work areas with a second floor being added for classrooms.

Six sanctuaries in five locations!

The present sanctuary is located on Park Avenue in Radcliff in Arcadia subdivision, the oldest housing area in the city. In fact, Park Avenue was the first paved street in Radcliff.

To celebrate one hundred years of the blessings of God the church had centennial celebrations and dedication services on January 11-12, 1987.

Gene B. Waggoner was the pastor and Terry Bennett was the Chairperson of the New Sanctuary Building Committee.

In the seventies we built the new recreational-educational building.

Ground was broken in April of 1973 and it was completed in September of 1974.

In the eighties we built the new 1,300 seat sanctuary. Ground was broken in September of 1985 and we had our first service in it on the Sunday before Thanksgiving, November 23, 1986. Then followed the renovation of the old sanctuary, completed in May of 1987.

Sixteen months in the 70's and 20 months in the 80's gives us 36 months or 3 years in building programs under the leadership of Pastor Waggoner.

The whole church plant is now worth four million dollars.

The first Stithton Sunday School was organized in 1906; the first Training Union in 1916, the first W.M.U. in 1935, and the first Brotherhood in 1955.

In 1952, under Rev. W.C. Dobbs, a church parsonage was built at 281 South Wilson Road. On February 5, 1969, under Pastor Waggoner, the church voted to sell that parsonage for \$15,000 and to buy the house and property located at 949 North Woodland Drive for \$28,000. On Thursday, June 19, 1969, Pastor Waggoner and family moved into this new parsonage. The house was built in June of 1966 and the property is 150 feet wide and 140 feet deep. This house was sold to Pastor Waggoner in January of 1979.

A Church Library was begun in March of 1962 with Mrs. Allen Bell as librarian. Full-colored church bulletins were used for the first time June 3, 1962. On August 7, 1963, the church adopted a Church Constitution and By-Laws as drawn up by Pastor Waggoner, Deacons Allen Bell and Dr. Marion Logsdon.

Stithton began a Bus Ministry in 1972. A 1951 Ford and a 1956 Chevrolet were first purchased from the school system. A new church bus, a 1972 Ford-66 passenger, arrived on October 15, 1971, at a cost of \$7,990.09. On November 9, 1974, a 1966 Chevrolet bus was purchased. In September, 1975, a 1970 Volkswagen Van was purchased. On July 19, 1977, a 1968 International 66 passenger bus was purchased.

On Saturday, May 14, 1988, 27 of 67 on a church bus of another denomination were killed as they returned from a trip to Kings Island. A drunken driver in the wrong lane of an interstate highway struck the bus and the bus burned. Stithton had six young people on that bus: two died, two were badly burned and two were able to get off virtually unharmed. Pastor Waggoner was asked by the community to bring the Memorial message at the North Hardin High School Football Stadium filled with 6,000 people on Thursday, May 19, 1988.

On Sunday, September 18, 1988, with an eye to safety, the church acquired two new buses. One, costing \$38,000, and seating 27, was donated by a family much interested in our bus ministry. The other, costing \$36,500, and seating 26, was paid for through contributions from our members and friends. A total of \$74,500! The 1972 Ford was also reconditioned and two of the older buses gotten rid of.

Stithton was the first church to be integrated, receiving her first black member on December 4, 1963.

The church was incorporated on January 3, 1964.

A new 5'8" Baldwin piano was purchased October 6, 1965, at a cost of \$2,275. Church bulletins were mailed out to all resident members weekly beginning on August 31, 1967. In the summer of 1968 the men of the church built an outside Amphitheater.

On December 19, 1976, 260 Standard and 50 White Gold new Baptist Hymnals were purchased and imprinted with the church's name by an anonymous donor in the amount of \$1,289.90. On April 20, 1978, the church purchased three new Kawai piano's and on October 6, 1978, our new Allen Computer Organ was installed at a cost of \$14,805. Schulmerich Handbells (three octaves) arrived June 17, 1980, at a cost of \$3,185.00.

On August 17, 1983, the church bought the house at 100 East New Street for \$53,000,

Many times Stithton has been among the top ten churches in the state in the number of baptisms and additions reported for a given year.

January 9, 1887 to January 9, 1989 - 102 years of Amazing Grace!

The reason Stithton Baptist Church exists today is because of the grace and goodness and mercy and greatness of God!

We continue to plant seeds for the future. Stithton Baptist Church is rich in its history. But the more important thing is that we make history today. Great as have been the blessings of God in years gone-by, the opportunity which confronts us today is the greatest we have ever faced.

We have a past to be proud of, a future to prepare for, but only the present to do it in. Jesus promised that "I, if I be lifted up, will draw all men unto Me." May His name be glorified by this membership and His will be done in all the work of this church. Lord, Your will be done!

Stithton Baptist Church is affiliated with the Severns Valley Association of Baptists, the Kentucky Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

There have been many feats of faith. The evidence of God's guiding hand is strong. " ... these days should be remembered." Esther 9:28. We thank God for the founding of this church and we express our thanks and our gratitude to the pastors and the devoted people of the congregation, who through the successive years of advancement, problems, difficulties, and rejoicing, have contributed of their vision, their devotion, their abilities, their money, their courage, their leadership, and self-sacrifice.

On April 13, 1989, the church purchased and erected a new highway church sign at the cost of \$8,900.

On October 10, 1990, the church voted to buy the Brown house located next door to the church at 105 East Park Avenue for \$61,000.

On December 9, 1990, the church purchased a seven foot Kawai concert grand piano for \$11,700.00 for the sanctuary.

Bruce Springer was ordained to the Gospel Ministry on December 16, 1990.

After 9 years of two Sunday morning worship services the church voted to build a new 1,300 seat sanctuary on May 5, 1985. Ground was broken for it on Sunday, September 15, 1985. A contract was signed for \$1,508,365.00. The church sold a Church Bond issue of \$1,300,000.00.
